

A REFLECTION

Philip Baker (16th January 2024)

Did you make a new year resolution this year? This is usually a promise to yourself about something you want to do better (or not do at all) but, unfortunately, often fails. Anyone who has read the Old Testament books, such as Exodus, chronicling the Israelites departure from Egypt and wandering in the desert in search of their promised land, cannot fail but be amazed at how often they ask God for something, receive it, promise to follow the law, and fail. Time and time again they wander from God's way, break His rules, suffer the consequences, renew their promises and then repeat their mistakes.

Any rational person would ask: why? Why not go along with God, do it His way and enjoy the clear benefits? But they don't and we are left to be amazed at their apparent obduracy, saying: of course we would be more sensible; we would not stray; we would follow the path on which are guided. But would we? Is there a clue in the way we dismiss our new year resolutions? Obviously there is – in reality we would be no better. Consider for a moment, we know what we are supposed to do and how we are supposed to behave, especially towards others (our neighbours). Do we really live up to those rules, those expectations of God of us and which we promise to adhere to? I know I fall short and I cannot believe I am the only one! I know what I am supposed to do but I come up with excuses and "reasons" for going my own way.

I write these words during the season of Epiphany, the biblical time when Jesus was revealed to the world as the Son of God. One of the consequences for us is that we are charged with passing on the Good News of salvation through Jesus to all our fellow humans. I suggest we challenge ourselves to make a belated resolution to do just that, be a light like the star of Bethlehem, welcoming all who are willing into the fellowship of Christ. Some of us are doing this directly through Alpha courses, but there is a way for all of us to do our bit. Let's see if we can keep this resolution going and make it a habit for the rest of our lives. Amen.

ELY CATHEDRAL RESIDENT AND PARISH PASSES

With the upcoming MU Banner Exhibition in the Lady Chapel in August, it will be useful if members were able to gain free entry to the Cathedral to visit the Exhibition, and at other times. If you are not already a Cathedral Friend or have a pass, here is the info about how this works for the different passes.

Resident Passes.

If you live in the CB6 or CB7 postal area you are entitled to free entry to Ely Cathedral. Please bring proof of address (e.g. a driving licence or household bill). The Residents Pass gives you free access to the ground floor of the Cathedral.

Parish Pass Holders.

Ely Cathedral offers free entry for those on the electoral roll of churches in the Diocese of Ely. To apply for a Pass you will need to complete a form, which has to be signed by your Churchwarden. *Please note: Expired Parish Passes are still valid for entry. There is no need to re-apply.*

You will be able to download a form on this page where it says "Ely Cathedral Parish Pass application form".

If you are not able to download and print a form, please ask someone in your Branch or church if they can help. If not, please contact Debbie Tye and she will send you a form.

Completed forms can be taken to the Ticket and Information Desk at Ely Cathedral between 10am and 4pm, Monday to Saturday, in order to collect your pass. If you are not able to come to Ely, please send your completed forms to Debbie Tye, and she will obtain a pass for you. Alternatively, if there is a group of you in your Branch wishing to apply, you could do this via a central contact (e.g. Branch Leader).

Also from Hinchingbrooke -

A plea from the Frailty and Dementia unit for more lap blankets

These are very popular, and patients take them with them when they move. Could you help?

Lap blankets can be between 32 and 40 inches, square or rectangular.

Faith In Action can accept squares as well as completed blankets, 6 or 8 inches preferably. I find the easy way to knit a square is by casting on 2 stitches, increasing at the start of each row until desired length, then decreasing at the start of each row, and finishing by knitting the last 2 stitches together.

The Angel Foundation (previously known as Property Angels) are no longer needing beds, but do want Settees and Chests of Drawers. These are for furnishing homes for abused families. Please message me for more information if you have either item to donate.

A REFLECTION – MU – March

This month I write about a true story and what we might learn from it. It has been all over the papers recently but the significance might have been overlooked.

It concerns a 9-year-old boy who was discovered in France to have been "abandoned" by his mother (who went to live with another single mother). She visited him from time to time, but he was basically living on his own. And no-one noticed. For two years he lived alone in a flat with no heating. And no-one noticed. He went to school every day and was "doing well". So, no-one noticed. He had no friends to notice. He was just an ordinary 9-year-old boy doing nothing wrong and not being noticed by anyone – his neighbours, his teachers, his school companions, the council (the mayor was a nearby neighbour).

But he should have been noticed, someone, in all those two years, should have noticed something was not quite right. Well, of course some people will have noticed but they ignored it. They probably told themselves that if he looked OK, he probably was OK. But he was not OK, he was only 9, a primary school student, living alone! Over those two years he even moved up to a secondary school, and still no-one noticed, or no-one who noticed actually did anything.

When it all emerged into the open, the mayor summed it up "He was really good at school, he did his homework, he was well dressed, he was clean and he was always on time. Kids like that fly under the radar, we don't worry about them". But the signs would have been there for anyone who looked.

It is very tempting to judge (unfavourably) those people who allowed this to happen for so long. So many people could have intervened. But in chapter 7 v1-2 of Mark's Gospel he reports Jesus as saying "Do not judge, or you too will be judged. For in the same way you judge others, you will be judged, and with the measure you use, it will be measured to you." He continues with the story of the speck in someone else's eye and the plank in your own. This causes one to reflect on just how perfect we are ourselves. Are we truly attentive to what is happening around us? In our busy lives, would we stop and consider if something that caught our attention needs investigating, or at least reporting as a concern?

I think we know the answer: we pass remote, abandoned petrol stations with "car cleaning" facilities, without a glance. We might even have used them, but have we spoken to the staff to gauge their condition – are they in slavery? We buy cheap clothing and other items at ridiculously low prices, but do we question what we know about the conditions in which they were produced, or do we count our lucky stars at picking up a bargain?

The abolition of modern slavery, child (and adult) abuse and all like things are part of the DNA of the Mothers' Union. Let us open our eyes and ensure that we live what we preach so that we can, not judge, but report instances which twitch our antennae and make us wonder "is everything here as it should be?".

Ministry to the vulnerable



A REFLECTION – April

As we reach the tumultuous finale of Jesus' earthly life over Easter, it is a good time to reflect on how the events of over 2000 years ago affect our lives today. The first, and possibly most obvious, thing to say is that the events of that first Easter were not the end, they were the start of a new era, one in which we still play a part today.

The Cross is the enduring symbol of Christian Faith. Among a host of personal interpretations it represents death to our earthly life being just a stage in the achievement of eternal life with God, for those who believe in the Word. Jesus had finished showing us what we had to do to achieve life with Him and He even gave a demonstration by rising to His new life once His work on earth was done. We will soon (at the time of writing) be looking at the events on the road to Emmaus, when Jesus proved this new risen life was possible (see Luke 24:13-35). As we annually remember those momentous events our life continues, but we are changed by living through the memory of Easter.

How did you get on with whatever sacrificial Lent gesture you chose to make – anything from giving up chocolate to spending extra time in prayer or Bible reading each day? Whatever it was that you chose to do was because it felt to be a "good" thing to do. So, if it was a "good" thing to do before Easter, why should it not be a "good" thing after Easter too? How about considering continuing some of these things on beyond Easter and making them a part of a new and better life? Perhaps what you chose does not suit being continued; well, start something else instead that you can build into your life. Anything that makes you a "better" person in the eyes of God, as shown to us by Jesus.

As this habit builds year on year at Easter, making a small adjustment each year to come closer to God's "ideal", we really will become "better" people, closer to God and more able to look forward with confidence to eternity praising God (see Proverbs 14:14).

A REFLECTION

Philip Baker (23rd April 2024)

With the reading plan I am following for my daily bible reading I also receive a "Verse of the Day" to contemplate. A couple of days ago this was taken from Paul's first letter to the Corinthians, chapter 10 verse 31 "So whether you eat or drink or whatever you do, do it all for the glory of God". At my last House Group session, we were talking about doing things without thought, just repeating words or actions by rote, simply because we are so accustomed to doing them. This verse should make us sit up and take notice of what we do, because it makes the point by inference that everything we do can be considered as being to the glory of God.

I often find Paul's writings to be obtuse, with meanings obscured in a whirlpool of words making convoluted arguments. This verse could hardly be more direct. Everything we have is because of the grace of God – we are not fearful, hungry and destitute as so many in our world are. Everything we do we are able to because through the grace of God we have the skills to use our hands, make and employ tools and understand how to plan for the future outcome we desire. All thanks to God.

Does it not therefore seem appropriate that we should regard ourselves in that light, as fortunate in ways we cannot control, and possibly do not deserve, through God's bountiful mercy? But we are so used to our good fortune that we do not give it any thought. Instead of being grateful for every mouthful of food, for our warm beds, our safe lives with social services at our backs in case of need, we take it as our due.

Even if it is only for the rest of the day in which you read these words, how about trying to give God His due for everything you experience: the next meal, talk with a friend, item you buy or use, even the flash of pleasure on seeing a shrub in full blossom, or a bird gathering materials for its nest. In thinking about how God has enabled us we will be acting to His Glory, recognising His place in our lives.



ST. NEOT'S BRANCH

St Mary's, St Neot's branch, regretfully reports that we have lost one of our oldest members, Mary Richardson, who died peacefully on 10th April aged 96. Mary was a long term, dedicated member of MU and worshipped at St Neots Parish Church all her life. Serving as voluntary parish secretary for many years, she organised many parish holidays and outings. She was well known to everyone, greeting people at the church door as they left at the end of the services. She also had a ministry to the bereaved when she worked for a local firm of undertakers, and in later years she was much involved at the Thursday Lunch Club run by the Voluntary Welfare Association in St Neots. Mary was a lovely Christian - prayer was a very important part of her life - and was an inspiration to us all. May she rest in peace and rise in glory.

We also have a 90th birthday to celebrate. Congratulations to Margaret Gates, 90 on 17th May!

SPRING DIOCESAN MEETING AND AGM

As well as the official business of the AGM and news from task group leaders the talk was given by Ruth New who is the Diocesan Development Officer for Children and Families. She gave a brief outline of her background and explained that the Archbishop's Council has invested in work with young people with lots of new initiatives. She is working closely with Mike Kelly (Youth Officer) and Revd Mandy Flattery (Missioner for Churches and Schools). There are 85 church schools in the diocese, and they are working with parishes to build links with the schools with initiatives such as the Parish School Covenant. 95% of children have no connection with faith and there are a decreasing number of children in our churches – this is a national trend. The aim of the National Church is to double the number of young people in our churches by 2030. Flourishing churches have more than 25 under 18-year-olds involved in their worship, but not necessarily worshipping on a Sunday. We need to support what is already happening and encourage new activities. We need to know how we can help local parishes to do what is right for them. There is a huge variety of economics in parishes. We need to work with the community that is already there and to value children and young people as equals in the Body of Christ. We need to 1) Grow in Confidence: take small steps to help things grow, to help how we can do things such as set up hubs in deaneries. 2) Grow in Commitment: this requires confidence, pray regularly about what is going to happen. Children's Work should be on every PCC agenda. The Church/School covenant will help. Talk to curates and incumbents regarding their ministry with children and families. Some incumbents have multi parish benefices and so teams to do this can be built within the benefice. 3) Grow in Competence: how do we train for a level of competence to help children grow in faith? There are courses available for core skills, as well as mental health and First Aid training for children and young people subsidised by the diocese. 4) Grow Creativity: learn how to engage with children and families where they are at; develop Messy Church; give opportunities to explore being part of a worshipping community. Faith develops in the home as less time is spent in church. We need to support them, to encourage meaningful relationships with adults and the family; to give confidence to talk about God, Bible Study and Prayer. In order to invite children and families we need safe clean toys and funding is available to buy a small amount of equipment. Resources are needed to enable them to engage with services. (Communion Play sets – children can hold up the chalice with the priest; a trail for the Easter story etc. We need to make sure families feel welcome and offer refreshments. We need to chat about faith in order to move on from toddler groups. Our job is to help the Holy Spirit grow and flourish. We need to meet people where they are and help them feel part of the wider community through "Sweaty Church" and other initiatives. It was pointed out that there is an ALM course in children's ministry and other national training initiatives. There was a comment that safeguarding puts people off but our culture requires this and is part of loving and keeping each other safe. Hazel Williams thanked Ruth and mentioned that there are funds available if churches need it. Keep praying!



A REFLECTION – June

Philip Baker

I am always searching out new angles from which to reflect on my confident belief in God, my Creator, and the other day I came across the following: "If the sea couldn't stop Moses, If a wall couldn't stop Joshua, If a giant couldn't stop David, If death couldn't stop Jesus, Then with God nothing can stop you". I suggest you read those words again, pausing at each and considering the immensity of the act behind each phrase. And there are so many other examples we could draw on. I hope it strikes you as it did me – amazing beyond words.

It reminds me of a song I rather like: "What a friend we have in Jesus", which draws on scripture in Exodus and John. How true that title phrase is. The song contains the following line: "We should never be discouraged - Take it to the Lord in prayer" which is a personal favourite, but the whole song is one of positivity, hope and praise. If you do not know the lyrics they are widely available on-line (or from me if you prefer). It reflects a message I learnt many years ago from a previous vicar here in Burwell, that provided what we are doing meets with the Will of God we need not be concerned, as everything we need will be supplied by Him. That proved to be the case then and I have applied the same principle many times since and found that, with discernment and prayer, it does indeed work out.

The point all this makes is that with God we can cope with whatever challenge faces us, be it one imposed on us or one which we have chosen to undertake ourselves. God really can do anything; all we have to do is ask Him for His help and submit to His Will. However, with God on our side, we have nothing to fear.

A Reflection

If you were asked to nominate the most significant, or important, verse in the Bible, my guess is that John 15:16 would be in contention: "You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you so that you might go and bear fruit – fruit that will last – and so that whatever you ask in my name the Father will give you." The next verse states "This is my command: Love each other." Taken together, these two verses set out everything we need, even alone, each gives a vital guide and reminder to us of our ultimate purpose.

Some of us take this absolutely to heart, give ourselves to God's purpose and become priests. Others, the majority, take the words to heart and try to live them out in our daily lives, using the skills and talents God has given us for that purpose. Such is the boundless Grace of God. One of the tasks that those of us forming the majority have, is to ensure that our priests receive our love and support in the measure with which they give it to us. We are all chosen by God – an amazing thought in itself – and He has a purpose set out for each of us. In the same way that Paul (and all the preachers of the early church) needed support from each other, the love of his fellow Christians, so today do those who take steps to "go and bear fruit" need the love and support of their fellow Christians.

In this increasingly secular and self-centred world we live in, speaking of rules which are hard to follow and of a God who knows us and what we do, is not always popular and requires great courage and effort. Let us always remember the words of Jesus reported by John and think of what they mean. Surely they tell us that we are God's chosen subjects; that He has a purpose for each of us – to spread His Word throughout all peoples; to always act with love, compassion and never count the cost. Those who have become priests are special and singled out to give freely of God's Word and love as His representatives on Earth. The rest of us have a duty to reflect those blessings as they fall to us, always remembering that we are all special in the eyes of our Lord.

Worldwide President's Tour of Oceania Comes To An End

The Worldwide President, Sheran Harper, has now successfully completed the five-week tour of Oceania countries, marking the final leg of her leadership journey before her term concludes in December 2024. This tour was a significant event, celebrating the global unity and shared mission of empowering women and supporting families. The journey was not just a symbolic farewell but a heartfelt exploration of the vibrant communities within Mothers' Union across the region, from Australia to New Zealand through to the Solomons Islands, each country offered unique insights and moments of shared joy and solidarity.

Ely Diocesan Mothers' Union Banner Exhibition


In preparation for the Banner Exhibition the Diocesan Banner needed to be removed from its glass case which is placed in a corner at the back of the north transept. I looked at it more carefully than I have in the past and was able to take some photographs of the detail of the banner. It was designed by Margo Bulman and embroidered in 1959 at St. Margaret's Convent, East Grinstead who were well known for their ecclesiastical embroidery. There are detailed notes on the design including the arms showing the Diocesan Three Crowns and the arms of the Mothers' Union, the escutcheon of the City of Westminster and uniquely for a lay organisation, a medallion of the Mother and Child.

This triennial theme builds on Transformation Now! which looks at how MU can continue to be relevant and reflect the needs of churches and communities in the 21st century. The clear message is that MU is evolving, and MU needs to grow if we are going to continue as a movement of members delivering change in communities across the globe. This theme asks us to proactively share about MU and encourage anyone who supports what we do, to join us and join in. It also asks existing members to take a look at what they feel able to do in their churches and communities, and to join in.

You will receive further information on how to use this theme. Hopefully, by telling you now, you can integrate this theme into your programme planning for 2025.

A REFLECTION – August

A recent Sunday sermon concerned God's amazing Grace – how, through the death of His Son, Jesus, on the Cross, we are all eligible for eternal life with Him. I thank God every day that I believe in this incredible gift, given freely to us, and that God knows me by name and is expecting me at some time in the future.

But I could not help but contrast this generous gift, this joy, with the state of the world today; how some people can reject all that is on offer to satisfy some personal need to do things which are so totally at odds with the nature of our loving God. There is hatred for those who do not share our thoughts, intolerance for anyone not conforming to our view. There is oppression by totalitarian regimes, a "leader takes all" mentality. Everywhere there is violence by the strong over the weak. Thoughts which culminated in the moment that someone attempted to assassinate Donald Trump – not a nice man (in my view) but not deserving of murder. Even within our mother church there is an inability to find a will to meet and compromise in other views, such that no Bishop could be appointed to Ely. Where in all this is evidence that the words of Jesus in John's account chapter 13:34 - "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another."?

This disparity between the ideals of love and tolerance versus the actions we see seem too great for us to overcome. But if we all, individually, reject these views then collectively we can make a difference. The big issues will take time, but we can straightaway make adjustments to our own lives as a start. We can forgive that driver who is discourteous instead of feeling annoyed by him (or her). In our daily lives we can ignore those who seek to provoke disharmony – like all such people they will soon give up if their efforts meet with no response. We can work to recognise that people are truly diverse in every conceivable way – God made us that way – and that everyone has a God-given right to be what they are and not be a copy of what we are.

Best of all, we can hold an image in our minds of how Jesus would have responded in any given situation and follow the command He gave us – "As I have loved you, so you must love one another".

PS – your homework this month is to read the prayer ascribed to St Francis. Speak to me if you cannot find a copy.

National Vice President of Mothers' Union, Mrs. Wilhelmina Graves, Visits UK to Promote Membership Among Ghanaian Community





A REFLECTION – September

Philip Baker (20th August 2024)

The House Group I attend has been working through the Gospel of Mark and, at our last session, we reached the section including the story of the blind beggar, Bartimaeus. You may recall that Jesus asked Bartimaeus "What do you want me to do for you" (Mark 10:51). Bartimaeus replied "Rabbi, I want to see" and Jesus restored his sight with the words "Go, your faith has healed you." (Mark 10:52). We were then asked to consider privately what we, as individuals, would ask God to do for us. How many times have you stood back and asked yourself that question? I cannot recall a single time that I have. Oh, I have asked God for a lot of things over the years but always in the moment, I have never stood back and viewed myself in the third party, as it were. However, I knew with instant clarity what it would be, something I have never considered but realised I have always needed (no, I am not going to share it!). It was a very powerful moment – read the story in Mark and then, while your mind is "in the zone" ask yourself that question – see what happens.

If the response proves elusive or even "nothing" then here is a thought to get you going. Every day in Compline as part of my daily prayer plan, I say the prayer of penitence that asks for God to forgive our sins and we confess "before the whole company of heaven and one another, that we have sinned in thought, word and deed and in what we have failed to do." We are usually aware of what we do that is wrong, but how often do we consider those things which we failed to do? Perhaps we could let our minds dwell on that thought for a while and ask God to help us to realise how we sin through carelessness. And this is why it is important: if we do not know the extent of our sin, we cannot acknowledge it and therefore confess it. We ask God (there you are, the link to the story of Bartimaeus) to forgive the sins which we have confessed. I leave you to fill in the blanks!

Congratulations to Kathleen Snow on the announcement of her election as the new President of the Worldwide Mother's Union. Kathleen, from Canada, has served on the Board for six years as the Zonal Trustee for the Americas and has been a volunteer facilitator for the worldwide parenting programme and the (MULOA) consultation, which engaged 200,000 members globally. She is also the Chair of the MU Development Committee, overseeing programmes like the transformational literacy initiative that empowers women and breaks the cycle of poverty.

Accepting the role, Kathleen commented "This is humbling, and a great honour. I look forward to working with members and staff to continue to build God's Kingdom through Mothers' Union. I am particularly excited that, as we carry forward the torch in January, we will be building on the firm foundations of our transformational programme work. We are about to start a new campaign, speaking up to right the injustice which means that, still today, 765 million adults cannot read or write, 2/3rds of them women, meaning they are unable to read medicine bottles, register the birth of a child, vote or ensure they get the correct change in the market. Sheran Harper (seen above with Bev Jullien), has been president for six years and will hand over to Kathleen in 2025.

The new Provincial President for the Canterbury Province is Comfort Fearon, currently president of Southwark and Julia Jamieson will continue for three more years as our Zonal Trustee.

QUIET DAY AT ST ETHELDREDA'S CHURCH, REACH



Led by Revd Paula Spalding, our MU Diocesan Chaplain on the theme: "Shalom: Wellbeing".

A small number of us gathered at the lovely parish church in the peaceful village of Reach, an ideal place for a Quiet Day. Paula based her five sessions during the day around the book by Ruth Rice: The A-Z of Wellbeing. Each session started with Bible verses, a short meditation and a period of silence. We could stay in the church, stroll or sit in the garden, or walk round the village, and we enjoyed fellowship over lunch.

The five sessions were: Connect; Learn; Get Active; Take Notice; and Give.

We CONNECT through good relationships with God and others, remembering God is Love. We look at nature and the world around us and feel the spiritual energy of church gardens.

We LEARN through God's word in the Bible and from other people. We breathe in God's word – he supports us and never leaves us.

We GET ACTIVE, which is good for the body and mind, and our faith translates into works we do in our lives and for others. God's protection and compassion is there for us, he loves and cares for us, and we can share this.

We TAKE NOTICE by stopping and being in the present moment, and trying not to worry about the past or the present. We are "God's Masterpiece", with new lives created through Jesus – made on purpose for a purpose. We can make time for our interests which give us life.

We GIVE in many ways to the church, of our time, and to others. Such acts which are beneficial to those who receive, also create a positive feeling within us, and lead to thankful hearts. A REFLECTION – October

I am going to start this month with what may surprise some, something that might be seen variously as a claim or a confession, but almost certainly unexpected. As I entered my twenties in the mid-sixties, I had a

grounding in both classical and rock music, and I have recently found the joy of contemporary worship music. Whilst I have reservations about some of the communities giving rise to this style of praise, there is much to find in the music itself.

One of the songs I find uplifting is called simply "Praise", written and performed by Elevation Worship (who also wrote "The Blessing", adapted by the Church of England so effectively). It contains the line: "As long as I'm breathing, I've got a reason to praise the Lord". Could there be a simpler summary of our belief? I am not suggesting that everyone should seek to enjoy this style of worship song, but I do suggest that we should think about how we express our faith and love for God, and be prepared to try whatever is available.

Psalm 96 is one of many to exhort us to greater expression of praise of the Lord. It is too long to quote here, but read it yourselves – It starts "Sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord all the earth. Sing to the Lord, praise His name;". Emphasising this, Psalm 100 starts "Shout for joy to the Lord, all the earth. Worship the Lord with gladness; come before Him with joyful songs." It seems to me that we are intended to celebrate our Lord God with simple joy and happiness, glad to be one of His own regardless of our circumstances in this life.

From the standpoint of someone looking at Christianity for the first time, much of what we do can appear impenetrable! Being direct and expressing our faith simply is surely good. When I was young, I could follow the whole service in Latin – but did not understand any of it! The earliest Christians had to make huge changes to what they did and how they perceived their faith. In a living faith we too have to continue that change as society around us changes. We can do it!

"Last Monday there was a most successful Garden Party held in the garden at Whitworth House. The previous week three trustees had spent an afternoon tidying the garden and we hope a volunteer gardener

will come forward to keep it in trim and support the young women who are keen to plant flowers. The trustees had provided a gazebo and extra chairs but the House supported the trustees in the provision of cakes and drinks.

The garden party was by invitation only and it was good to meet the support workers, two of the young residents, former trustees and representatives of other agencies including Kristian Hewett, the newly appointed chaplain to CCHP (Cambridge Churches Homeless Project) and Diana from WHAG (Women's Homeless Action Group). Diana has offered to speak about WHAG to the MU so I could pass this on to Stapleford, Sawston & Linton branches or perhaps a diocesan day?

Those who wished could go inside the house and we were shown one of the rooms for a resident which was currently empty and the kitchen/diner/common room. It was particularly interesting to speak with the support workers and young residents who are so appreciative of the support that the Trust and the MU give. The 4 bedding packs supplied by the Trust recently have all been put to use already. As well as the welcome bags, they are in need of a constant supply of essentials – soap, toothpaste, shower gel, sanitary products.

The support workers spoke of the activities they plan for the residents: crafts, cooking, a hot chocolate evening etc. Many are at college and it was rewarding to hear how the computer recently given to a resident has been so much valued and appreciated in supporting her in her studies. In the vacation they were able to go to a nearby activity centre and they all spoke so positively about the interests and enthusiasm of the residents, though not hiding some of the difficulties encountered when they first arrive and have to work through. Some residents were volunteering at the Shepreth Wildlife park and particularly the hedgehog rescue centre which gave them a sense of motivation that something was relying on them."



My name is Francine Nsabimana and I live with my husband Jerome and our six children in a village called Bibuye in the country of Burundi.

I am saddened to say that I used to have no peace in my heart or in my family.

I was really miserable, with no money for food or clothes and I didn't live in perfect harmony with my husband, because we didn't have the words to speak to each other. We lived in a straw house with a roof that let the rainwater in. I was always afraid that it would fall onto my children one day.

I didn't have clean clothes or soap to wash myself so I didn't want to go to church and I was afraid to approach others to find out how I could improve my life, as I knew no better.

One day I heard about this programme from my neighbours who told me that there is a literacy and numeracy circle opened by Mothers' Union in my parish. So I joined even though I felt ashamed of how I looked. I hoped that this programme would improve my living situation.

Out of curiosity I recently checked on-line for which "Awareness Days" were coming up in November and I was genuinely astonished at the range of contenders: everything from a World Kindness Day to a World Vegan Day; there is an Apple Day, a Brush Day (!), there is even a Social Media Awareness month, a National Spa week and a National Sandwich Day (honestly, these are all listed on-line, I am not making it up). Unsurprisingly perhaps, among the vast range of special days, weeks or months there is no mention of any need of "being prepared for God to come".

Whilst it is no doubt good to bring many of these causes to mind, Luke reminds us in 12:40 that "you must also be ready, because the Son of Man will come at an hour when you do not expect him." The one thing foremost in our minds should be "are we ready?". How many times have we parted from someone and almost immediately thought of something we had intended to say or do – but it is now too late. We do not want to be in a similar position should we find ourselves face to face with our Lord, because what we have not done will no longer be possible.

So, what are we supposed to have done? A recent Sunday sermon in my parish church gave the answer to that in a consideration of Mark 10:35-45. If you read that section, you will see that we are expected to be humble, be a servant and serve all. This is where the passage "For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve" appears. Matthew 6:19 refers to the need for us not to seek our reward on earth but in heaven "where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal" – in other words, a reward which is durable and lasting. It is a guide we would do well to follow, be humble, act like Jesus, serving others without expecting any reward, other than God's. Perhaps the World Kindness Day is not so far off the mark after all!

This is a report by the Church of Nigeria Communication officer of an address given by Mrs Angela Ndukuba, President of the Mothers' Union in Nigeria. If you look closely at the photo you can see her Mothers' Union badge.



Have the Mind of Christ in You. Mrs Angela Ndukuba

Mrs Angela Ndukuba, the President, Mothers Union/Women's Guild and Girls Organisation of the Church of Nigeria (Anglican Communion) has called on all leaders, Christian and especially women to embrace the mind of Christ in all they are doing to reduce challenges, misunderstanding, fighting, struggles and competition to overtake one another which is facing many facets of life today. She made this call while delivering her recent presidential address at the 25th edition of the annual women conference of the Diocese of Abuja,

She opined that servant-leadership style has remained the hallmark of the body of Christ.

"Jesus gives us practical examples as believers and leaders in our different capacities. Apostle Paul in his letter to the Philippians presented Jesus and His exceptional humility as the perfect example for Christians. The servant's heart of a leader is illustrated with the humility that Christ displayed in coming to earth. She added that allowing and letting this mind of Christ be in everyone will promote our appreciation and tolerance for one another and will represent Christ in better image before men and women in this generation and generations to come.

"I humbly invite us to prayerfully accept, adopt and follow Jesus Christ as our role mode as we journey in our Christian pilgrim progress to eternal life. You can make it in Jesus' name. it starts by surrendering your life to Jesus, and desiring to be like him in thought, word and deed."

On the state of the nation, Mrs Angela urged the Federal Government of Nigeria to issue licenses to modular refinery operators to boost the production of petrol and to reduce the pump price of the product at the filling stations. She stated that the removal of fuel subsidy in May 2023 has continued to increase hardship among citizens. We are calling on the Federal Government to restore the fuel subsidy or make our refineries work.

"The high cost of transportation has affected every aspect of the lives of Nigerians and contributed to high inflation figures. Some people had to resign from their employment because of high transportation costs.

Capable interested Individuals should be given licenses to own standard modular refineries that will reduce the number of illegal refineries being dictated regularly. Reputable existing private refineries in Nigeria should be allowed to function and serve the people directly and Nigeria should stop the importation of refined petroleum products and encourage local production".

Mrs Ndukuba urged organisers of protests in the country to sheathe their swords and embrace dialogue, saying that protests are often hijacked by suspected hoodlums to unleash more hardship on Nigerians. She called on the Federal Government to listen to the issues raised by the protesters and find a lasting solution to alleviate the conditions and sufferings of the people.

Mum managed to go for a long walk on her own, which never happens at home. The trip provided her with opportunity to relax, reflect and recharge".

We now look forward to the Christmas season, and Our Wish is to help those whose lives are not as fortunate as ours. CHRISTMAS GREETINGS TO ALL FROM ELY DIOCESAN MOTHERS' UNION

MU RETREAT, HIGHGATE HOUSE, CREATON, NORTHANTS: 25-27 OCTOBER 2024



A weekend away at this country retreat house was a real blessing at the end of October. Philip Baker was instrumental in arranging and organising the accommodation and the programme, with Revd Paula Spalding leading the Services. Highgate House became part of the Christian Conference Trust this year, which has two other centres serving churches and Christian charities and organisations.

We arrived on Friday afternoon and were warmly welcomed with afternoon tea, before settling into our rooms, and then gathering together for Evening Prayer. Then there was a chance to admire the lovely scenery and beautiful sunset before we had dinner. We had several Bible Study sessions throughout the weekend, with free time in between each session, to have some quiet time, read and pray, or explore the grounds and the historic Manor House – as well as enjoying lots of chat and tea, coffee, cakes and biscuits! A Nature Trail provided an opportunity to wander through the trees and fields around the hotel. Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner were also included each day, with a choice of menus and enjoyable food.

There were 20 of us all together, mostly from the Ely Diocese, with two joining us from the neighbouring Dioceses of Peterborough and St Edmundsbury & Ipswich. The Bible Studies were based on well-known Songs and Prayers from the Old and New Testament. Each day started with Morning Prayer, then Evening Prayer before dinner, and finishing with Night Prayer (Compline) at the end of the day. Sunday morning worship included Holy Communion and I found this very meaningful to share in this special time together. In between we had a few study sessions during

the day and evening exploring the passages and sharing together. Paula had created an interactive prayer corner in one of our meeting rooms.

The readings included: Psalm 103; David's Prayer (1Chronicles 29:10-14); Song of Mary (Luke 1:46-55); the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-10); and the Song of Zechariah (Luke 1:68-79). Each different passage sparked thoughts and comments about our faith and the faith of the Bible characters involved. I learnt a lot about these passages and gained some new insights. If Philip hought we might be stuck for conversation during the sessions, he was proved wrong by how engaged we were with the subject matter and discussions. We readily enjoyed the suggestion of singing some hymns and songs. (I think I would have liked more music content as well.)

The weekend concluded on Sunday afternoon with a "Feedback" session which had positive comments for all the hard work that Philip and Paula had put in. Another time it would be nice to have one longer break with free time during the weekend, to allow opportunity for more extended reading/praying/quiet times or exploring our surroundings. Although we weren't a very large group, smaller break-out sessions might have given more people the opportunity to engage with the conversations and share our thoughts.

During the weekend another group from the Reformed Church International (Zimbabwe) arrived. We were invited to join in with one of their (lively) worship sessions. I hope to be able to put together a YouTube picture video showing some of the photos taken over the weekend, and will try and include the RCZ video.

The Centre staff were so friendly and helpful which made for a pleasant atmosphere. The company had only taken over the premises in June this year, when refurbishment of the building was completed, they were keen to ensure we had a good time and that any comments for improvements or issues were taken on board.

We think this retreat might be a "first" for MU in the Ely Diocese. It would be great to have another opportunity to do something similar another year. A "Very Big Thank You" to Philip and Paula for leading the weekend so ably and thoughtfully. I came home feeling rested and spiritually refreshed, having enjoyed the fellowship of the group – with a chance to catch up with fellow MU Members and also be able to make some new friendships.

The first things that were requested were blankets and knits for the children, as the children and babies were dying from the cold. This was how Stitches of Hope was born, to save lives in Rwanda. Since then, hundreds of knitted items have been sent to Africa and more recently to the poorest countries in Eastern Europe. When war broke out in February in Ukraine, many of our handmade items brought hope and comfort to those who really need to feel remembered.

Over the past 30 years Christian Hope International has grown and now works through the Anglican Church both in Rwanda and Uganda, now supporting both children and adults and many projects to help those in need.

The organisers appreciate our support and wish to pass on their thanks.'

A REFLECTION – December

As we approach Christmas our thoughts turn to the joy of welcoming the baby who would become our Saviour. It is a wonderful time summed up in the phrase "Goodwill to all men" (and women, children, of all races, colour and faith). Or is it? That joy seems to evaporate so quickly in the gloom of British winter weather. Yet everything that Christmas, and Jesus, stands for is still there, therefore so too should our joy be.

I recently came across these words, presented in the form of a joke notice in a library – "The post apocalyptical fiction section has been moved to current affairs." And this is, I think, the true cause of our depression. The worst thing to deal with is uncertainty and we live in a world in which we have instant notification of events worldwide but we do not know what calamity is round the corner. But we do know that far too many people have the power of catastrophic destruction. No wonder we are worried.

My prayer this and every day is for self-interest to be turned into love of others and into the search for peace so espoused by Jesus. There are so many well-known passages in the bible speaking of love and peace, perhaps none more precious than Jesus' words captured in John 13:34 "A new commandment I give unto you: love one another. As I have loved you so you must love one another".

The mindset prevalent among leaders of nations puts me in mind of another light-hearted but pointed quip – "Before we work on Artificial Intelligence should we not do something about Natural Stupidity?" Might I suggest that we harness these thoughts to extend the joy of Christmas through January and even beyond? Just as the old saying "a dog is not just for Christmas" is true, so too is "Jesus is not just for Christmas"! His teachings reported so thoroughly and clearly by the gospel-writers apply to us today just as much as they did 2000 years ago. His birth arguably means even more now than it did then because we understand its significance better. What Joy!
