Although Jo will no longer be a trustee she will continue to work with Whitworth House.

Gill Uttin is also finishing her term as a Trustee. She has in recent years been Vice-President for the Cambridge Archdeaconry and before that served as our Worldwide Officer, keeping members informed about the work taking place across the world as well as giving many talks to branches.

A REFLECTION

Philip Baker (15th January 2025)

This is the season when we look to the year ahead and start planning for all those changes that, this year without fail, we will finally get to do. Decorating a room (or more), a garden makeover, the holiday we have been thinking about for years; most, if not all, pipedreams which, if we were honest with ourselves, we know we will still be thinking about in a year's time. And yet it is human nature to want, well, almost anything! We are never content with what we have and are always planning for something different. It is a human condition.

How often do we think about what we have just celebrated – Christmas? The arrival on earth of our Saviour Jesus Christ. There can be no bigger change than this, nothing could ever be the same once God's Son was with us as a fellow human being. We need to think about what this really means for us, certainly more than His contemporaries did – they found Jesus inconvenient, what we would today call a "disrupter". And of course He was meant to be but no-one really likes having their routines disturbed do they, so they crucified Him. But that did not get rid of Him. We will soon be starting to think about what happened then – Jesus defeating death and rising again in glory, which was not the outcome the Pharisees had in mind!

Given the parlous state the world is in, largely as an outcome of all the unintended consequences of a world-full of people all individually planning changes based upon their own priorities without regard for everyone else, perhaps what we should all be wanting achieve this year is recognise the place of God in our lives. There are no end of biblical sources supporting the general contention that if we have God in our lives we have all we need, such as Psalm 16:5 or Philippians 4:19 and the most beautiful Psalm 23. Letting God be a part of our lives and plans has a calming influence, and recognising that all we have to do is live in the footsteps of Jesus Christ (or at least try to) might give us a little peace amid all the striving of our combative world.

OF MOLES & MINIMUM

Several years' ago, in another country, I was sitting on a low wall in the sunshine, working out in my head how I could renovate a little stone house of two or three hundred years past. It would have to be done tastefully without losing its charm. I would have to scrape down the oak rafters, for a start. And the "patio" in front of the wooden door was partly stones and partly concrete. Wallflowers bloomed through the cracks. My neighbours thought I should knock it down and built another then where would the ghost go?

Suddenly, without a sound, a mole popped its head through the rubble, right in front of me! It arrived on a puff of dry earth, stared wide-eyed at me for a few seconds and then disappeared exactly how it had arrived. Didn't turn around, just disappeared with a quiet "plop". I am not sure which one of us was the most surprised. First time I had seen a mole up close. I was amazed at the speed of him.

It occurs to me that Mothers' Union ladies often operate in a similar way to the moles. They use their own methods and channels of operation like the moles' galleries, they do their work quietly and without advertising, they travel great distances to meet other ladies abroad who are dedicated to improving their own and others' lives. They perform small miracles every day, they knit, sew, teach and carry huge weights of items in their collections for the homeless and other charities. Their faith in God is paramount. And they are so rarely seen in action!

The other day I rang my friend M. to ask her to call by for a shoebox full of little baby sweaters I had knitted. I mentioned that there was nothing much going on at my end regarding collection of unwanted small furniture, or clothing. Put down the phone, switched on my computer – and there was a request from J. She had met a lady at the village's get-together who was anxious to find someone who would want the contents of her caravan she had just sold. It was essential she find somebody efficient quickly. Would the MU want these items? Yes, we would!. So I took the telephone number of the donor from J., checked that the items were in good state, rang M. again to be sure she and her dear husband could pick up the items and make arrangements to collect direct between them, the lady being in our village. I used to do the lifting but age has crept up on me.

M. had hoped to clear pre-Christmas donations from her garage during the week but everything happened so fast. The donor was desperate to get the caravan items out of her kitchen – they were all over the floor, she said. So by the time M. called by at my home for the baby sweaters on the Sunday the caravan items had all been wrapped up by the lady donor, all pristine and ready to go, M. and G. had shifted the lot!

J. had been down to my house for the second time, with two large kitchen knives to donate. All this activity happened over three days! Telephones ran hot.

So three dedicated Minimum MU Mole-Members toiled at speed to get another job done. Phew!

Make a Mother's Day Appeal Celebrate Mothering Sunday with a Gift that Changes Lives

Mothering Sunday is a time to reflect, remember, and celebrate the women who nurture and guide us. But for many families around the world, home is not always a place of peace.

In the Solomon Islands, over 85% of children experience violent discipline. Parents long for a better way—to create harmony, to teach love, and to build a future where their children can flourish. Through Mothers' Union's Worldwide Parenting Programme, we are making that hope a reality.

Sidonia, a mother and now a grandmother, saw her family transformed after attending a Mothers' Union parenting course:

"Before, our home was filled with conflict. Now, we live in peace. My children have learned to share, and my husband has given up drinking. I thank God every day for this change.

This Mothering Sunday, you can bring peace to more families by <u>purchasing an ethical Gift of Peace</u>. Each gift helps parents gain the skills they need to create loving, stable homes for their children.

I was really inspired by the use of the **2025 Prayer Diary** in their meeting at Yaxley. We are going to follow it at our branch meeting in March, when we unexpectedly have a vacant slot. If you would also like to do this Irene has a more detailed plan which she has sent to me and I am happy to forward on if you get in touch. It might help us all to use the diary more regularly.

For our **February meeting**, Yaxley branch members all brought copies of the 2025 Prayer Diary. We looked at the focus of each month and the new features this year's diary contains. We all read the January monthly prayer and discussed the creative prayer activity. The February reflection starts with "May we bloom where we are planted" Everyone was given a small bag of cress seeds to encourage them to try the creative prayer. With Mothering Sunday in March, the "Make a Mothers' Day" appeal leaflet was hi-lighted. Following the first line of the monthly prayer for April "Lord, I light a candle as a symbol of love" candle holders and candles were given to everyone. It was suggested that the cress seeds, for February, could be sown in the holders. May, "Thy Kingdom Come" we sang "We seek your Kingdom" (To Abide with me), held up our hands for "pray for 5 and invite 1" just like the ladies in the picture.

Our clergy will feel supported if members do as the creative prayer for June suggests. At this point in the diaries several people found that the centre page is becoming loose, one had been lost completely, hopefully not an intended feature! One thing that is missing this year, is the map. Looking at the seaside donkeys for July, we thought about the AFIA holidays and sang "We're all going on a summer holiday", after which we decided that we didn't sound much like Cliff Richards. We also thought about not everyone being able to go on a summer holiday. The creative prayer in August helps us think about our founder Mary Sumner, and enjoy eating sweets. The Power of Reconciliation for September, some had heard of "The Community of the Cross of Nails" We placed nails in the shape of the cross. October looks at those in prison and those who are persecuted. We thought about our links in Nigeria and India who are both high on the Opens Doors list of persecuted churches. November's picture of the shoes and the reflection will help to prepare for the "16 Days" later in the month. December, Invitations and gifts, everyone was invited to use their Prayer Diaries, daily, weekly or monthly and to fill in the prayer requests and "Things I'm Thankful For" on the last pages. We finished with our Worldwide President, Kathleen Snow's message on the back cover.

During Lent, we are called to journey with Jesus along the difficult road that leads to the cross, a road marked by sacrifice, pain, and ultimately, redemption. It is a journey that resonates with the struggles we face in our own lives and in the lives of those around us.

MU has produced a new Lent Calendar and there is a reflection, poem and prayers, as well as a Holy Week and Easter meditation.

As we focus on Living Hope this Lent, maybe choose one resource and journey with it. Lent isn't about doing everything; it's an opportunity to prepare for Christ's Resurrection on Easter Sunday. A season to grow in hope and draw closer to God.

A REFLECTION

Have you noticed how frequently the number 40 crops up in the Bible? Moses spent 40 days on the mountain being prepared to lead the Israelites out of Egypt (Exodus 24:18), culminating in the second set of stones bearing what we refer to as the 10 Commandments (Exodus 34:28 – the first set of stones Moses destroyed, see Exodus 32:15-20); the earth was flooded for 40 days to rid the earth of creatures except those saved in the ark (Genesis 7:12), and there are many more. On Ash Wednesday (which falls this year on 5th March) we enter the 40 days of Lent, which many suggest recalls the 40 days Jesus spent being tempted in the desert (Matthew 4:1-11) and is a period of contemplation culminating in the deeply contrasting events and emotions of Easter.

Our 40 days ends in the ultimate glory of Easter, and traditionally we mark it by denying ourselves something, such as chocolate. I have a suggestion. The Bible is interesting and reading it helps us to understand our faith so, for a change from the usual, instead of chocolate, how about giving up a little time each day to think of God and read the Bible? There are lots of plans available on line, although I use a completely free app on my phone (YouVersion) which offers several plans to choose from, including reading the whole Bible in 365 days (that is what I do and it takes around 15 minutes a day). Alternatively, try to read the first 24 chapters from the book of Exodus (which includes the 40 days Moses spent on Mount Sinai) and all 28 chapters of the Gospel of Matthew (which is the story of Jesus up to His Resurrection at the end of our 40 days of Lent). That should be an easy read in 40 days. taking about 15 minutes each day for a chapter from each. If that is not enough (or instead), for a lovely story of faith and love read Ruth, which is really short.

Whatever we do, let us make sure we remember God's amazing love for us as shown by the sacrifice He made on the Cross, followed by His example of rising to life again.



THE DIARY OF AN INTREPID CYCLIST



I finally got around to finishing this diary last summer with the incentive of having a copy available for the Banner Exhibition in the Cathedral. It is now nearly 10 years since I started this venture. The idea was to promote the Mothers' Union in the Cambridge archdeaconry, so over 7 months I cycled nearly 700 miles and visited 147 churches. I experienced most types of weather except snow and hurricane and doing without my husband's map reading skills was sometimes a bit of a challenge.

Having recently been asked for a copy from a MU member and now promoting it at my church, if anyone would like one, I can print to order. The cost is a donation to providing welcome bags of toiletries and underwear for

new residents at Whitworth House. Although MU members are generous in providing some of the items needed, the usual spend is about £20 a bag and I deliver 6 bags two or three times a year. They are very gratefully received as some of the young women arrive with only the clothes they are wearing.



A REFLECTION

As you read this, we are coming to Easter and the shops are full of Easter Eggs and Hot Cross Buns. Our celebration is joyful. Do we think much about what the first Easter must have been like for those who witnessed it?

Easter ends the period of time we call Lent during which, by some small acts of sacrifice, we have been calling to mind Jesus' withdrawal into the desert for 40 days and nights to prepare for His ministry and to overcome temptation by the devil. Do we think what that means for us?

On Palm Sunday, we recall the day that Jesus rode into Jerusalem on a donkey to live out the climax of His ministry. The people were jubilant – here was their Messiah – but Jesus must have known what was to happen. Do we wonder what must have been going through His mind?

Just a few days more, Good Friday, also known as Black Friday, Great Friday and Holy Friday, would bring Him to His death on the Cross. He did this for us. He did it to provide us a path to salvation and a life with God. Do we marvel at His generosity – giving His own life that we might live?

Finally, the glory of His resurrection on Easter Sunday. It is said that if there is one thing we as Christians can say to show our faith it is: "Christ is Risen – Indeed!" It is the defining moment for us when He shows himself to Mary Magdelene and entrusts her to tell His followers. Do we consider how that directly impacts our own path through death?

Last month I reflected upon possible acts of sacrifice to show our solidarity with our God and suggested giving up a little time for some light Bible reading. I don't know how many were able to follow my suggestions, but I closed last month saying "Whatever we do, let us make sure we remember God's amazing love for us as shown by the sacrifice He made on the Cross, followed by His example of rising to life again." That was true last month, just as true this month and will be true every month until we follow in Jesus' footsteps right to the end.

Clementine Dushimimana is the new Mothers' Union worker for **Shyogwe Diocese in Rwanda** and this is her recent letter to Ely Diocese.

Dear Irene Porter,

I greet you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

I sincerely apologize for not being in touch earlier. Last year, I started my role as a Mothers' Union worker, and over the past months, I have been busy learning about Shyogwe Mothers' Union; how it operates, ways to improve it, and how to encourage greater participation from women.

Several important initiatives have taken place. We have mobilized and trained the Mothers' Union committee at the parish, archdeaconry, and diocesan levels, encouraging and empowering members in their responsibilities. We have also been preparing for a couples' gathering and conference, aimed at fostering unity and strengthening families within the church community. Additionally, we are encouraging creativity among women and youth through an art and design project, as well as a sewing project, both of which will expand further this year.

A REFLECTION

Easter is now in our rear-view mirror; we have been through the extreme range of emotions from the agony of the crucifixion to the ecstasy of the resurrection, but is it in fact now over? Of course it isn't, rather it is the start!

The original Apostles had to come to terms with the events of that first Easter. Understandably they took time to realise the enormity of what they had just been part of and lived through, Jesus had died on the Cross and risen again to life, in fulfilment of the Scriptures and to give mankind the opportunity of turning to God and having heavenly life after earthly death. I cannot imagine the effort that understanding this must have taken. And then the realisation of what this meant for them. This is where we are in that process – coming to terms with the implications of what it means to be a follower of Christ. At Baptism services there is this question: "Do you renounce evil and turn to Christ?" – that is what we have to ask ourselves now.

Fifty days after Easter we come to Pentecost, which is when the Apostles and their followers were gathered together and the Spirit of the Lord came down and filled them. This gave them the strength to go out and preach the gospels to everyone who would listen. In a sense it marked the beginning of the church, when it grew from a band of followers to a movement. Those Apostles have long ago joined with God, and others have taken up their work. This process of passing the job on to successive generations has been going on ever since then, and we are in a direct line of descent from that time. It is now our turn and when we have done what we can those we have enthused will continue it on.

This Easter season let us reflect on that continuum and rejoice in our part in it. Let us be filled by the Holy Spirit and be enthused to do our part for the growth of our Faith. Let us see ourselves as part of God's earthly Kingdom that has been at work for the past two thousand years.

If you, friends or church members have any picture postcards (either new or used) please pass to Jean Webb. They will be given to MAF for their fundraising.



Nick explained that Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF) is a Christian airline mission – the largest humanitarian airline in the world. It has been running for 80 years having started just after the war with the purpose "to fly for life" to isolated (both spiritually and physically) places, preaching and saving. There is the Christian Vet Mission in Africa, also evangelising. He spoke of flying a pastor across Madagascar to minister in a prison. Aircraft are flying every 6 minutes to build communities, bring the gospel, and support the local church by bringing the love of Jesus. They are reaching the most isolated people in the most remote corners of the world. They work in many countries, some of which cannot be named due to security risks. They have flown representatives from 1500 charities, responding to disasters, bringing medicines and supporting community development and training.

There are 1350 people working for MAF throughout the world, as pilots, booking agents, radio operators, mechanical and electrical engineers. Only 2% of workers actually fly, the rest are important to keep it operating. The light aircraft carry 4-13 people depending on size of plane and operate to the same standards as any aircraft. They have to be used to rough runways. There are 1,000 destinations in 24 countries transporting 125,000 passengers around the world, travelling 6.1 million km. Roads in many places are impassable in the wet season and so MAF enables people to get on with their work. They are able to fly people in quickly to deal with medical situations, and in some places medical staff give up a week's holiday to run eye clinics in remote areas. 295 eye surgeries were performed in a 5-day clinic in Kenya. Pilots are not medics but may often get involved with administration. Children are flown to and from school at the beginning and end of term. In supporting development work, an agronomist may be flown in to an area to teach better crop growing. Surplus crops are taken by plane to be sold elsewhere. When building schools in remote areas all materials have to be flown in. 3.1 million people have been displaced by the war in Sudan. MAF has flown in cargo and medicines, on 33 flights, 200 passengers and 26 tons of cargo to transit camps for refugees. Bible translators are also carried. In Angola, the Halo Trust has removed 100,000 of the 10 million landmines and MAF rescued 1,000 refugees after terror attacks in Mozambique. MAF works with cut off communities in jungles, mountains, deserts, swamps as well as conflict and disaster zones. It overcomes formidable barriers for those trapped in isolation and poverty. Communications are improving with mobile phones. On return engineers have to clean the dust out of engines. Aircraft are used for ambulance work, tool boxes, school transport, food delivery and disaster relief. He asked members to pray for MAF, volunteer or donate either by legacies or collecting postcards which can be sold to raise money. It costs £60 - £70 million to run the charity. They do not charge for services but ask for a contribution later. They bring help, hope and healing to communities. Pilots give a percentage of their income to support the work and are all Christians, praying before take-off. MAF is working with younger people in order to recruit volunteers.

In His peace, Sue Claydon

Change, so much change! A new leader of the Roman Catholic Church, a new President of the USA, a strong negative reaction to current political parties in the UK and a new Worldwide President of the Mothers' Union. It feels as though we are caught up in a maelstrom of change over which, as individuals, we have little say. I have picked on just four examples, which show how all aspects of our existence are affected by such events. However, we are naturally inclined to view these matters in very different ways.

We have all formed our views on matters of politics. We see the goings on in the USA with some detachment, knowing we will be affected but peripherally. However, we see UK politics very differently, feeling deeply involved in the issues at stake. Yet this does not reflect the global impact of each, with the USA potentially influencing far more people around the world than anything we do in the UK. Matters of religion on the other hand are based on immutable truths, any change here is relatively superficial and unlikely to have any serious impact on us.

So, our reactions are related to how much we ourselves are personally affected. Where does that leave the new Pope and our MU President?

The Pope arguably has the power to have the greatest impact on the people of the whole world of all these examples but, until we consider it, how many of us immediately felt that? By working mainly with the vulnerable and most marginalised people around the world, the MU has enormous influence to do good. Both of these operate in God's name, is that a co-incidence? I think not, and that it shows when you go behind the sensationalist headlines you find God working, as He has done for millennia, to support those who need help, love, compassion. We have nothing to fear from these changes, so feel safe and less involved.

It gives me a great sense of hope that, throughout all the change we hear so much about, God has not changed at all and is continuing to work through us, his followers and servants, just as He always has done. Alleluia!



RISE UP awards

Later this month, awards will be presented to branches and churches who are actively championing the RISE UP against domestic abuse campaign.

These awards recognise groups that are raising awareness and supporting local domestic abuse organisations through meaningful action. There are three award levels and to achieve the bronze award your branch or church should:

- 1. Put a RISE UP poster raising awareness about domestic abuse in an appropriate public place such as in churches, toilets, community centres, village halls etc.
- 2. Commit to pray for those affected by domestic abuse, including the victims, survivors, perpetrators, and those who work in the field of domestic abuse.
- 3. Make a connection with your local domestic abuse support organisation to see how you can support them.

Almost every branch already fulfils section 3 because many contribute to helping the refuges, with whom we have close contacts, through diocesan or branch collections of goods or shop vouchers. Brampton MU Branch is the first in the Ely Diocese to be awarded a Bronze RISE UP certificate and we hope many more will follow. A REFLECTION

The final verse of Isaiah 57 is possibly one of the most frequently stated in everyday conversation: "There is no peace for the wicked" (NIV). We all say it, often with humorous intent, but how often do we really think about what we are saying? The Good News Bible puts it slightly differently: "There is no safety for sinners". That makes more sense now, doesn't it. Isaiah 57 is all about good and evil and punishment, hence the final verse above. I love the Book of Isaiah because it speaks plainly (albeit in old-fashioned terms) and 57 explains why only those who turn to the ways of our Lord will be saved; only those who humbly do God's work will receive His help.

It opens with a word of cheer for those who walk uprightly — "they find rest as they lie in death" (Isaiah 57:3). But how do we walk "uprightly"? This is explained in the following chapter, Isaiah 58:10-11-"... if you spend yourselves on behalf of the hungry and satisfy the needs of the oppressed, then your light will rise in the darkness, and your night will become like the noonday. The Lord will guide you always; He will satisfy your needs . . ." This seems to me to be another echo of John's Gospel, 13:34 "A new command I give you: love one another. As I have loved you, so must you love one another". I have searched dozens of translations and they all say the same thing. Does this not seem to be the very essence of the Mothers' Union? Giving ourselves into the service of those less fortunate, to help them out of their misery and into a better place; to love them as God loves us, as precious people deserving of love.

We are starting to consider how to celebrate 150 years of the Mothers' Union next year. I find it hugely comforting that the movement started by Mary Sumner and followed passionately by thousands of people around the world ever since, is so deeply rooted in scripture, and that we can see the very direct connection between what we try to achieve and the way of life determined by God as leading to salvation and peace.

This month I start with a verse from John's gospel, 20:21, which reads: Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." It goes on to refer to spreading the Holy Spirit, but the essence of the message surely is in the verse quoted above. As disciples of Jesus, whom we all follow as He is the Way to Heaven, that is our charge, the mission with which we are all entrusted. Jesus went out to meet people where they are, to teach them the Word and to support and help them in their daily travails. This is what we do in the Mothers' Union; we have a job to do – to be active disciples of Jesus carrying on the work he started among the peoples of the world.

A rather overlooked book of the Old Testament, the Prophesy of Obadiah, has something to say about this. Little is known about Obadiah and his book is just one chapter long, but he writes about the Edomites, who were related to the Israelites through Esau, the brother of Jacob. Now God chose Jacob and when the Israelites were being over-run (by either the Philistines or the Babylonians, it is unknown which), the Edomites stood by and watched from the safety of their mountain hide-outs. Even though they could have helped their relatives, they didn't. Obadiah's prophecy concerned a vision in which God promised retribution on them for their inaction. The moral of this book is that to stand by when evil is being committed and not use whatever means is at hand to prevent it, is to be part of the crime. You cannot escape God's judgement!

This relates to the verse from John – it starts with an expression of God's Peace and continues with an exhortation to act as Jesus would, and there are plenty of examples of Jesus intervening in situations where people need help. Thus the focus of our work as members of the Mothers' Union is clear – not to stand by when we see evil being done; to spread the message of Peace that Jesus preached and to act as Jesus would. Reading stories of the work being done makes me think we are trying to do exactly that, Hallelujah!

It is with sadness that I report that our dear friend **Angela Jones** died on 5th August at the Arthur Rank Hospice. We will forever remember such a gracious, loving and gentle lady whose active kindness and leadership enhanced so many lives of all age I'm sure we will all treasure our memories of her and are so grateful that she can now rest forever in the safety of God's peaceful presence. *Sarah Mascall*

A REFLECTION

We will soon arrive at All Hallows' Eve, or Halloween. This is, as we know, the evening before All Hallows' Day, or as we usually term it, All Saints Day and is widely celebrated by children dressing up as ghostly characters and being given sweets. The connection between celebrating the lives of saints and remembering our ancestors, and dressing up as ghosts is clear. But the modern celebration has distorted our understanding.

Based on pagan celebrations, All Saints Day arose from an edict issued by Pope Gregory in the eighth century that November the first be a day to honour saints, a term originating from the Latin "sanctus" meaning holy or sacred. I like the definition in Wikipedia that tells us that "The Feast of All Hallows, the Solemnity of All Saints, and Hallowmas, is a Christian solemnity celebrated in honour of all the saints of the church, whether they are known or unknown". To me that final phrase is vitally important, "whether known or unknown".

When we think of "Saints" our minds turn to the named saints who have achieved their sainthood through recognition of deeds in support of the Faith. And this is fine, but we might overlook all those who might fall into the definition of a saint ("a person recognised for their exceptional holiness, virtue, or service to God") but have not been formally elected or "canonised", and I would suggest that there are many people who might fall into that category but conduct their "saintliness" largely unseen.

Continuing the theme, All Saints Day (on first day November) is followed on the second of November by All Souls Day, when we commemorate all those who have passed within the Faith. This is an opportunity to remember all those who followed in the path shown us by Jesus and lived their lives as best they were able according to His rules. We will all know someone we have walked the way with who fits into that measure, and probably within the Mothers' Union somewhere in the world.

So, this Halloween, let us gather our thoughts around the Christian aspects of this festival, starting with the internationally recognised saints and then moving through the ranks to include all those we have known and loved who have done their best on this world for the love of God.

Two grant applications were received by the trustees, for the Susan Baker Memorial Fund. These were awarded to Littleport towards expenses to help expand their Foodbank work into a Community Hub and to Bury for resources, seating and storage for a dedicated children's space. 

ELY DIOCECAN DAY OCTOBER 2025 with JULIA JAMIESON, Zonal Trustee for Canterbury Province



MU displays of worldwide and local initiatives.







Talk by Julia Jamieson, MU Zonal Trustee, on new central initiatives:

Julia spoke about her background and said that she had been introduced to MU by her mother-in-law, and enjoyed attending her local afternoon group to listen to a speaker and have a cup of tea. She had been warmly welcomed by the group but wanted to explore more about MU by attending Deanery and Diocesan Meetings as well as the Annual Gatherings. She saw the positive impact that MU was making on the world around her and the wider world. She spent 3 years on the World-Wide Board and then

3 years on the new World-Wide Board as part of a leadership team of 14.

Global MU: What does it mean to us? There was a short discussion in small groups. It is not just a few old ladies in a church hall; It is central to Africa; AFIA; in parts of the world it is women's empowerment through literacy projects; savings groups; prevention of gender based violence; financial sustainability. The central MU role is governance, to ensure that we are working within charity laws and financial controls. It is a member led movement and so although the Board makes decisions it is guided by its membership. Trustees can be asked to serve on additional boards, but it is only trustees who have a vote. Julia asked "How can we celebrate the 150th anniversary and encourage others to join us?" it is our duty to keep the flame of MU alive around the world. Care and concern is important locally and helping those in adversity is the core objective. Although members in Britain and Ireland are contributing most financially there is an affiliation agreement for overseas members similar to subscription. Support is needed in order to set up projects until they are self-sufficient. The Literacy Project after 20 years is an example. Those who benefited are trained to serve and support each other. The programmes have restored dignity. We are a "handing up" not a "handing out" community. There are still many members unable to contribute due to war, displacement, or just struggling to survive. In Burundi, one of the poorest countries, 144,000 have learned to read and write; 7,500 have accessed parenting education and this has improved relationships. We have changed lives by giving a voice to the voiceless. Julia urged us to continue to support our fellow MU members with prayer and contributions.

Central Charity: Bev Jullien oversees a reduced staff team of 20 and all that they do is scrutinised by the elected trustees. There is targeted support for Britain and Ireland members and conversations from the Leadership Conference are available on the resource's hub of the MU website. The World-Wide Board is tasked with putting faith back into all we undertake, and there is a personal chaplain for the board. There will also be a new central chaplain.

150th **Anniversary**: We need to celebrate: where we have come from; what we have accomplished; and our faith and love for the Lord. In 1876 women did not enjoy the freedom we have today. The MU challenged social norms and fought against injustice and Mary Sumner prayed when she faltered. Julia asked "How are you using your gifts?" "How can we stay connected?" we need to look beyond the boundaries and energise and support one another. The MU website has details of information about central celebrations including the service at St Pauls Cathedral and the Annual Gathering. The Global Gathering is in South Africa from 30th September – 2nd October 2026. We need to consider what we can do to support MU either by being a Martha or a Mary.



Jean and Hazel attended a harvest lunch with members of the **Wisbech and North**Nene Branch and other invited guests. A traditional ploughman's lunch and fruit crumble was served and a food raffle raised funds for the MU.

For the MU 150th celebration, they are planning a diocesan wide, Hands Across the World Display, and are asking all members to draw around their hands on A4 paper and add when they joined MU and what made them join. These will be laminated and cut out. More details in the December Newsletter.

Sue Clayden announced, at the Diocesan Day, that on **10**th **December**, also Human Rights Day, there will be online prayers and reflections from India, Liberia and Papua New Guinea, thinking about how domestic violence impacts women throughout the **Anglican Communion**.

We will soon arrive at All Hallows' Eve, or Halloween. This is, as we know, the evening before All Hallows' Day, or as we usually term it, All Saints Day and is widely celebrated by children dressing up as ghostly characters and being given sweets. The connection between celebrating the lives of saints and remembering our ancestors, and dressing up as ghosts is clear. But the modern celebration has distorted our understanding.

Based on pagan celebrations, All Saints Day arose from an edict issued by Pope Gregory in the eighth century that November the first be a day to honour saints, a term originating from the Latin "sanctus" meaning holy or sacred. I like the definition in Wikipedia that tells us that "The Feast of All Hallows, the Solemnity of All Saints, and Hallowmas, is a Christian solemnity celebrated in honour of all the saints of the church, whether they are known or unknown". To me that final phrase is vitally important, "whether known or unknown".

When we think of "Saints" our minds turn to the named saints who have achieved their sainthood through recognition of deeds in support of the Faith. At the side of our tree is a large collection box for donations of toiletries for the women's refuge in Cambridge.








Once again, we have put up a display in St George's church for the 16 days of activism against gender-based violence.

A REFLECTION

Here we are, in Advent, looking forward to Christmas and celebrating the birth of our Lord, Jesus Christ, fully man and fully God. And we do so with the Advent themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love in our hearts. It always seems to me that these are expressions of something far deeper, and without which they would have only limited meaning, and that is Faith.

Without our Faith we would just see Jesus as a man, a remarkable man to be sure, but lacking the most important dimension of all, his relationship with God, the creator of all things. It is our Faith that enables us to recognise him as part of the Trinity and the means through which we may find our place with God.

In common with probably every Christian I have struggled to explain Faith. It is easy to dismiss it as "what I believe" but that seems to me to be a cheat. And then I read Hebrews. Of course, I have read it before and again just recently as part of the reading plan I am following. But this time it struck me as never before. Hebrews 11 must be the ultimate definition of Faith. No matter how many times you have read it, I urge you to read it now, or at least before Christmas. It is not very long, but too long to reproduce here, I am afraid, so out with those bibles!

No-one knows who wrote Hebrews, but it was probably in about AD60. It is a letter to encourage early Jewish Christians, who were wavering in their new beliefs, that Jesus is the true fulfilment of Old Testament history and prophecy. Today there are millions of believers, so although we cannot say how influential this particular letter was, it is tempting to consider that it probably played a significant part. When you read it, you might see why.

As we look forward to Christmas we are mindful of the tremendous impact of the birth of baby Jesus, of his coming into the world as one of us. Faith is the gift of God (Eph 2:8-9,) and Jesus shows us how to have faith in God's promise to save us and bring us to eternal life, how to live by faith until that day. Our faith in Jesus being not simply a remarkable human being, but also the Son of God, in recognising our need for his salvation, gives us stability and hope, which is secure in him. When the day comes, let us be sure to be ready, as the householder in Luke 12:39 is urged to stay awake to be ready for the thief in the night.
