
TEAM UPDATE

GOOD NEWS

Comberton wins prestigious Churchyard Award

Since 2020, a steering group at <u>St Mary's Church</u>, <u>Comberton</u> have been working to create a haven for wildlife in their churchyard. This year, their first steps were rewarded with a Silver Award in the Wildlife Trust's Churchyard Conservation Scheme. Find out more about the scheme in <u>Cambridgeshire</u> and <u>Norfolk</u>.

Rendering of West Dereham Chancel Complete

The walls of St Andrew's Church were, like many churches, suffering in places due in part to the use of cement. As a result of the deteriorating clunch the east chancel window had to be replaced. To prevent further problems it was decided to re-render and limewash the chancel walls. There was evidence that lime render had originally been used. New rainwater goods and drainage were also installed. <u>Explore the church</u>.

Recording the Past for the Future at Fenstanton Church

On Sunday 29th May, St Peter and St Paul Church welcomed a new addition, a book. This was no ordinary book though; produced over four years this was a comprehensive, illustrated record of the church building. The beautiful book was created by volunteers from the Huntingdon Church Recording Group. Church Recording was first introduced in 1973 and has since grown into a fascinating activity for thousands of volunteers. MAINTENANCE MATTERS

Recommended Monthly Tasks

From SPAB's Faith in Maintenance Calendar.



September

- If your roof space has safe access and is boarded, check whether there is evidence of leaks or damage to the roof covering during heavy rain, especially below gutters.
- Clear away any plant growth from around the base of the walls and in particular from the drainage channel.
- Make sure that water tanks and exposed water and heating pipes are protected from frost. Any leaks should be repaired.
- Make sure that any airbricks or under floor ventilators are free from obstruction and clean if necessary.

October

- Check masonry for signs of damage. Report any deeply eroded mortar joints or cracks or signs of movement.
- Check that snowboards and access walkways are in a good state of repair.
- Clear leaves and debris from gutters and rainwater pipes regularly and check for any storm damage. Frequent attention may be needed if the building is surrounded by trees or perched on by pigeons.

November

- Check that the flagpole is secure.
- Check the roofs for damage. Debris on the ground from broken or missing slates and tiles indicates that there may be a problem.
- Clear leaves and debris from gutters and rainwater pipes regularly and check for any storm damage.
- Take part in SPAB's National Maintenance Week in November.



Heritage Skills for Christian Buildings Grants Programme

The Benefact Trust has announced details of its new Heritage Skills for Christian Buildings Grants Programme. It will focus on supporting skills which can be used on Christian (ecclesiastical) heritage buildings - recognising that such skills may also be beneficial to the wider heritage sector.

The aim of the programme is to ensure that heritage skills, which are essential for the conservation of historic Christian buildings, are preserved and promoted through apprenticeships, scholarships, and training courses. It will support organisations offering such opportunities by providing funding to enable them to train individuals who are pursuing a career within the heritage sector. <u>More details here</u>.

Suspended Grants Programmes

The **Tudor Trust** will remain closed until 1st April 2023: "We are reducing our direct grant making...to create time and space for Tudor's staff and trustees to re-think how the Trust operates."

The **Jill Franklin Trust** will remain closed to church repair projects until at least December 2022. The Trust has decided to focus all its income to relieve poverty and distress among its clients, especially in the North East of England. ENVIRONMENT

Works to Trees in Churchyards

Most works to churchyard trees will need consent from the Archdeacon. Following the very dry summer, there has been a significant increase in requests coming to the Archdeacons for works to trees. Getting consent can be very straightforward, but only if the correct information is submitted to support the application. PCCs should take a look at the guidance published on the <u>diocesan website here</u>.

If your churchyard has been formally closed to new burials, works to trees (and other churchyard features) will normally be the responsibility of the relevant local authority. If you are not sure whether your churchyard is formally closed, please contact the church buildings team at dac@elydiocese.org Works carried out by local authorities in churchyards will still require the relevant diocesan consent.



OTHER SUPPORT

SAVE THE DATE: Tuesday 15th November

Following on from the audit of church buildings and communities undertaken during 2021, the **REACH Ely** project team will present the final report and results from the project, together with a suite of new guidance, videos and tools churches can use to enhance their role serving their wider communities.

A new book published by Church House seeks to serve as a starting point to provide inspiration. It is not a set of big ideas which will beyond the capacity of many parishes, but is instead designed to address some key areas where applying relatively small changes can make a big difference. Bust the myths on portable appliance testing

Portable appliance testing (PAT) is the examination of electrical appliances and equipment to ensure they are safe to use.

There are many common myths about PAT - use the <u>HSE's frequently asked questions</u> to find the key facts about the inspection and testing of portable electrical equipment.

You can download the leaflet on <u>Maintaining portable electric equipment in low-risk environments</u>. There is also general advice on electrical safety at work.

Safe Use of Ladders and Stepladders at Work

HSE has released the latest annual fatality statistics, and there were 29 fatal injuries caused by falling from height in 2021/22.

Ladders and stepladders are not banned under health and safety law. They can be a sensible and practical option for low-risk, short-duration tasks, although they should not automatically be your first choice. To help you make sure you use the right type of ladder, and that you know how to use it safely, HSE has updated guidance on <u>staying safe when using ladders</u> at work. It now includes:

- more detail on competency, and what that means for ladder users and those managing ladder use on site
- key safety advice for using telescopic ladders
- practical tips for using combination and multi-purpose ladders
- good practice for securing ladders

You can also download the guidance document <u>Safe Use of Ladders and Stepladders</u>, which was jointly produced by HSE and the Ladder Association.
