CHRISTMAS GREETINGS TO ALL FROM ELY DIOCESAN MOTHERS' UNION

#### MU RETREAT, HIGHGATE HOUSE, CREATON, NORTHANTS: 25-27 OCTOBER 2024



A weekend away at this country retreat house was a real blessing at the end of October. Philip Baker was instrumental in arranging and organising the accommodation and the programme, with Revd Paula Spalding leading the Services. Highgate House became part of the Christian Conference Trust this year, which has two other centres serving churches and Christian charities and organisations.

We arrived on Friday afternoon and were warmly welcomed with afternoon tea, before settling into our rooms, and then gathering together for Evening Prayer. Then there was a chance to admire the lovely scenery and beautiful sunset before we had dinner. We had several Bible Study sessions throughout the weekend, with free time in between each session, to have some quiet time, read and pray, or explore the grounds and the historic Manor House – as well as enjoying lots of chat and tea, coffee, cakes and biscuits! A Nature Trail provided an opportunity to wander through the trees and fields around the hotel. Breakfast, Lunch and Dinner were also included each day, with a choice of menus and enjoyable food.

There were 20 of us all together, mostly from the Ely Diocese, with two joining us from the neighbouring Dioceses of Peterborough and St Edmundsbury & Ipswich. The Bible Studies were based on well-known Songs and Prayers from the Old and New Testament. Each day started with Morning Prayer, then Evening Prayer before dinner, and finishing with Night Prayer (Compline) at the end of the day. Sunday morning worship included Holy Communion and I found this very meaningful to share in this special time together. In between we had a few study sessions during

the day and evening exploring the passages and sharing together. Paula had created an interactive prayer corner in one of our meeting rooms.

The readings included: Psalm 103; David's Prayer (1Chronicles 29:10-14); Song of Mary (Luke 1:46-55); the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-10); and the Song of Zechariah (Luke 1:68-79). Each different passage sparked thoughts and comments about our faith and the faith of the Bible characters involved. I learnt a lot about these passages and gained some new insights. If Philip hought we might be stuck for conversation during the sessions, he was proved wrong by how engaged we were with the subject matter and discussions. We readily enjoyed the suggestion of singing some hymns and songs. (I think I would have liked more music content as well.)

The weekend concluded on Sunday afternoon with a "Feedback" session which had positive comments for all the hard work that Philip and Paula had put in. Another time it would be nice to have one longer break with free time during the weekend, to allow opportunity for more extended reading/praying/quiet times or exploring our surroundings. Although we weren't a very large group, smaller break-out sessions might have given more people the opportunity to engage with the conversations and share our thoughts.

During the weekend another group from the Reformed Church International (Zimbabwe) arrived. We were invited to join in with one of their (lively) worship sessions. The Centre staff were so friendly and helpful which made for a pleasant atmosphere. The company had only taken over the premises in June this year, when refurbishment of the building was completed, they were keen to ensure we had a good time and that any comments for improvements or issues were taken on board.

We think this retreat might be a "first" for MU in the Ely Diocese. It would be great to have another opportunity to do something similar another year. A "Very Big Thank You" to Philip and Paula for leading the weekend so ably and thoughtfully. I came home feeling rested and spiritually refreshed, having enjoyed the fellowship of the group – with a chance to catch up with fellow MU Members and also be able to make some new friendships.

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#### CHRISTIAN HOPE INTERNATIONAL

This year, Joanna and I have been given many knitted donations to go in the container which goes to countries in need of them.

I received a letter of thanks from the office in Romford.

'It is 30 years since Christian Hope International first came into being, as a result of the horrendous events of the 1994 Rwandan genocide.

The first things that were requested were blankets and knits for the children, as the children and babies were dying from the cold. This was how Stitches of Hope was born, to save lives in Rwanda. Since then, hundreds of knitted items have been sent to Africa and more recently to the poorest countries in Eastern Europe. When war broke out in February in Ukraine, many of our handmade items brought hope and comfort to those who really need to feel remembered.

Over the past 30 years Christian Hope International has grown and now works through the Anglican Church both in Rwanda and Uganda, now supporting both children and adults and many projects to help those in need.

The organisers appreciate our support and wish to pass on their thanks.'


At St George's Church, Littleport we have once again put on a display in the church advertising 16 days of Activism against Gender based Violence.

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#### A REFLECTION - December

As we approach Christmas our thoughts turn to the joy of welcoming the baby who would become our Saviour. It is a wonderful time summed up in the phrase "Goodwill to all men" (and women, children, of all races, colour and faith). Or is it? That joy seems to evaporate so quickly in the gloom of British winter weather. Yet everything that Christmas, and Jesus, stands for is still there, therefore so too should our joy be.

I recently came across these words, presented in the form of a joke notice in a library – "The post apocalyptical fiction section has been moved to current affairs." And this is, I think, the true cause of our depression. The worst thing to deal with is uncertainty and we live in a world in which we have instant notification of events worldwide but we do not know what calamity is round the corner. But we do know that far too many people have the power of catastrophic destruction. No wonder we are worried.

My prayer this and every day is for self-interest to be turned into love of others and into the search for peace so espoused by Jesus. There are so many well-known passages in the bible speaking of love and peace, perhaps none more precious than Jesus' words captured in John 13:34 "A new commandment I give unto you: love one another. As I have loved you so you must love one another".

The mindset prevalent among leaders of nations puts me in mind of another light-hearted but pointed quip – "Before we work on Artificial Intelligence should we not do something about Natural Stupidity?" Might I suggest that we harness these thoughts to extend the joy of Christmas through January and even beyond? Just as the old saying "a dog is not just for Christmas" is true, so too is "Jesus is not just for Christmas"! His teachings reported so thoroughly and clearly by the gospel-writers apply to us today just as much as they did 2000 years ago. His birth arguably means even more now than it did then because we understand its significance better. What Joy!
