MARY SUMNER, BEFORE MOTHERS' UNION

We know about Mary Sumner establishing Mothers' Union, but you may know little of her early life. "George and Mary Sumner, Their life and times" a book written by Joyce Coombs, gives quite a detailed insight into their family history.

George Henry Sumner was born on July 3rd, 1824. George's father, Bishop Charles Sumner, was a prominent figure at the coronation of Queen Victoria in 1837. The Bible on which she took the coronation oath was afterwards presented to Bishop Charles.

George was educated at Eton, then later Oxford.

After leaving Oxford in 1845, George embarked on the "Grand Tour". His cousin, Mrs Wilson and her daughters, had taken a house in Rome for the winter. A Mrs Heywood was doing the same with her daughters. The two mothers called on each other. At a new year's ball George was introduced to Miss Margaret and Miss Mary Heywood.

Mary Elizabeth Heywood was born on December 31st, 1828, the youngest of three children. The three Heywood children spent an idyllic childhood in the green rolling countryside of Herefordshire and the each had their own ponies. The children were educated at home, Mary's brother Tom later went to Eton. The days of girls school had not yet arrived. Every year the family went abroad, Mary kept a journal of the places visited and became fluent in French, German and Italian. Mrs Heywood took the two girls to Rome to complete their musical education, perfect their Italian and enjoy the Opera, Mary had ambitions to become an Opera singer, attend concerts and balls. It was at one of these balls that Mary met George.

On July 26th, 1848, George Henry Sumner married Mary Elizabeth Heywood. George's father, the Bishop of Winchester, married them and as the young couple left the church the bells pealed out as they walked on a pathway of scented petals.

The first years of married life was spent at Crawly Hampshire, where George was curate, having been ordained in 1849. They then moved to Farnham so that George could act as chaplain to his father. In 1851 George and Mary moved to Old Alresford Place where they lived until 1885. During that time Mary Sumner's experiences and observations of motherhood and family life led to the founding of Mothers' Union. Mary Sumner conceived the idea of an organization for women, something more than a mothers meeting. It was to bring together all mothers, the rich, talented and elegant, the poor and uninstructed and illiterate. Simple cards, with rules and advice, were given out to those attending the first meeting. Members signed the card and a register was kept. Hence the name arose of enrolling member.

In the early days an organization leaflet gave advice on meetings which happened to include the following;-

It has been found a good plan to provide a general tea before a meeting for all the married women of the poorer classes, and to invite the mothers of the upper and middle classes to assist with that.

It also advised that the hymn "Hark, my soul, it is the Lord" be generally sung at meetings.

After a few years of just local meetings, word spread, to become the organization we know today. The Mothers' Union was born.

I think she would be amazed at what Mothers' Union has achieved since those early days.
